FIRST TEACHING FROM THE SMALL CATECHISM OF MARTIN LUTHER

In ancient and modern times, Lent has been the time for instruction of candidates preparing for their baptism at the Easter Vigil. At the same time, the whole Church anticipates Easter through acts of repentance and spiritual renewal. It is therefore appropriate that we review the basics of our faith during these Sundays in Lent, so that we all might be renewed by our baptismal covenants and made ready for the celebration of Easter.

The First Article of the Apostles' Creed concerns Creation. What does it mean?

**I believe that God has created me and all that exists. He has given me and still preserves my body and soul with all their powers. He provides me with food and clothing, home and family, daily work, and all I need from day to day. God also protects me in time of danger and guards me from every evil. All this he does out of fatherly and divine goodness and mercy, though I do not deserve it. Therefore I surely ought to thank and praise, serve and obey him. This is most certainly true.**

The Second Article of the Creed concerns Redemption. What does this mean?

**I believe that Jesus Christ—true God, Son of the Father from eternity, and true man, born of the Virgin Mary—is my Lord. At great cost he has saved and redeemed me, a lost and condemned person. He has freed me from sin, death, and the power of the devil—not with silver or gold, but with his holy and precious blood and his innocent suffering and death. All this he has done that I may be his own, live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he is risen from the dead and lives and rules eternally. This is most certainly true.**

The Third Article of the Creed concerns Sanctification. What does this mean?

**I believe that I cannot by my own understanding or effort believe in Jesus Christ my Lord, or come to him. But the Holy Spirit has called me through the Gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, and sanctified and kept me in true faith. In the same way he calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it united with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church day after day he fully forgives my sins and the sins of all believers. On the last day he will raise me and all the dead and give me and all believers in Christ eternal life. This is most certainly true.**

#### \*PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

As we return to the waters of baptism during this season of Lent, let us pray for the church, those in need, and all of God's creation.

Let us pray for the one, holy, catholic church; for all preparing for baptism; for all hungering for grace. Give us your Word of Life, for we cannot live on bread alone. God of mercy,  
**hear our prayer.**

Let us pray for the earth and all the fruits of your creation; for rain forests and deserts; for polar ice caps and wetlands; for wilderness lands and wild animals. God of mercy,  
**hear our prayer.**

Let us pray for the nations, plagued by war and famine; for those who govern and those who work for justice; for the most vulnerable, especially children. God of mercy,  
**hear our prayer.**

Let us pray for those in need of angels to wait on them; for the sick and those in prison (*especially*); for the homeless and destitute; for all for whom we forget to pray. God of mercy,  
**hear our prayer.**

Let us pray for this assembly; for those who make music in our worship and those who serve on the altar guild; for church school teachers and those who care for our grounds. God of mercy,  
**hear our prayer.**

Let us give thanks for the faithful witnesses who have gone before us, that together with them, we might seek to serve you alone. God of mercy,  
**hear our prayer.**

Into your hands, God of abundant grace, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your mercy, through Jesus Christ, our Savior.

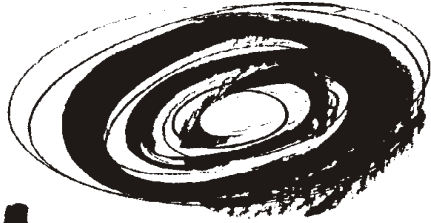
