FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT February 26th, 2023 ♣ 10:15 a.m.

In the early church Lent was a time of intense preparation for those to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. This catechetical focus on the meaning of faith is at the heart of our Lenten journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. 

The peace of the Lord be with you always. And also with you.


MEAL



*THANKSGIVING AT THE TABLE

Christ will come again.





UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

George Herbert, hymnwriter, died 1633 Wednesday, March 1st

An excellent scholar, Herbert served briefly in the English parliament, then became a parish priest. He was known for devoted care of his parishioners, as well as for writing poetry and hymns, including "Come, my way, my truth, my life." He died at age 40.

John Wesley, died 1791; Charles Wesley, died 1788; renewers of the church Thursday, March 2nd

These brothers led a revival originally intended to remain within the Church of England, one that involved frequent communion and advocacy for the poor. Except for a brief time in America, they worked in England. Charles was also a prolific hymn writer. After their deaths, their work led to the formation of the Methodist Church.



Traditionally, Lent is a time for giving up something. People quit eating chocolate or drinking coffee or alcohol. Lent becomes a time to fast from all sorts of things that are not good for our physical or spiritual health. What if people were instead invited to take on a practice during Lent: daily prayer, daily scripture reading, meditative walks, acts of kindness and generosity. What might forty days of taking on such practice yield?

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

NERVE, SKILL, AND TRUST

It's tempting to write off Jesus' victory over temptation as admirable but distant from our own experience. Usually nothing as obvious as a devil appears in order to engage us in repartee, let alone quote scripture. Right and wrong are seldom so clear. The stuff that actually tempts us on a daily basis stands out by how dull it is in comparison to today's gospel; when in recent memory have any of us been offered world domination? Then there are those elegantly-crafted responses Jesus pulls from thin air without missing a beat. When ambushed, how often can we think on our feet and argue effectively? We may be in awe of Jesus; can we identify with him?

The temptations of Jesus follow his baptism. He has been called Beloved by God. What will he make of that? Will he manipulate the environment purely for himself, pretend to be helpless by taking risks, or try to take over? Fall off the temple, or fall down before Satan? The religious and political tests foreshadow the accusations in his final trials: that he threatens the temple and Caesar. Our own temptations may not be imperial or divine, but they are specific to our relationships and callings. We who share baptism in Christ must also discern on a daily basis what to do with the gifts and power we have.

Much Christian devotion has encouraged letting go of power; but too often goodness and passivity have been equated, with terrible consequences. Today's gospel encourages developing our ability to struggle and to defend ourselves, not least against the accusing voices within our own heads. We sing, "lend us your nerve, your skill and trust in God's eternal word" ("O Lord, throughout these forty days," ELW 319). We may be surprised at the angels that join us for our song.
