In today's gospel reading, Jesus tells a vineyard parable, which serves as an image of Israel, the prophets' mission, and Christ's death. For Christians, the vineyard also speaks of God's love poured out in the blood of Christ, given to us for the forgiveness of sin. Grafted onto Christ the vine at baptism, we are nourished with wine and bread so that we may share Christ's sufferings and know the power of his resurrection.



*PEACE


The peace of the Lord be with you always. And also with you.



*THANKSGIVING AT THE TABLE

You are indeed holy, almighty and merciful God. You are most holy, and great is the majesty of your glory.

You so loved the world that you gave your only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life.

We give you thanks for his coming into the world to fulfill for us your holy will and to accomplish all things for our salvation. In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:

To you, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Massie L. Kennard, renewer of the church, died 1996 (TFF) Tuesday, October 10th

A native of Chicago, Kennard was a major figure in supporting and working toward ethnic and racial inclusiveness in the former Lutheran Church in America. Ordained in 1958, he served in positions including Director for Minority Concerns of the Division for Mission in North America.

CORNERSTONES

Quoting the Psalms, Jesus says in Matthew 21:42, "The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes." To the common, often invisible people who had heard Jesus speak and witnessed the miracles of healing he performed, these words rang sure and true.

The Bible is full of examples of rejected people who play vital roles in the kingdom of God. Joseph, whose brothers scorn him as a foolish dreamer, becomes a key figure in the book of Genesis and in salvation history. Moses, hidden as a baby to keep him from being killed, becomes a great leader and liberator for Israel in the book of Exodus. Mary, a teenage girl from a small town, is chosen by God to be the mother of the promised Messiah in the book of Luke.

Similarly in our communities, seemingly inconsequential people are often the ones whose lives richly produce the fruits of the kingdom for all of God's people. The man who serves at the local soup kitchen each week is one of the cornerstones of the kingdom. The little girl laughing on the playground is unaware that her joy nourishes everyone she meets. The woman who devotes hours balancing the budget each month is vital to carrying out God's mission in our community.

Jesus invites us to live in a reality where the humble are stronger than the proud and the powerful. The fruits produced for the kingdom—qualities like peace, joy, humility, service to others, and trusting faith—are not the kinds of things that can be measured by most of the world's standards. And yet these are all building blocks that point to a kingdom that is beautiful beyond our wildest imagination.
