In the turmoil of hope, fear, and disbelief that these predictions provoke in us, Hebrews sounds a note of confident trust. Christ makes a way for us where there is no way, and we walk it confidently, our hearts and bodies washed in baptismal water, trusting the one who has promised forgiveness. The more we see the last day approaching, the more important it is to meet together to provoke one another to love.


The peace of the Lord be with you always. And also with you.

COMMEMORATIONS

Elizabeth of Hungary, renewer of society, died 1231 Sunday, November 17th

Born in Hungary, Elizabeth was betrothed to the son of the Landgrave of Thuringia, and at age four was taken to be raised with him at the Wartburg Castle. Ten years later they were married. She was very generous to the poor, and after her husband's death she lived in cruel hardship until her own death at age twenty-four.

Clement, Bishop of Rome, died around 100 Saturday, November 23rd

Clement was the third bishop of Rome. He is best remembered for a letter he wrote to the congregation in Corinth, still struggling with the same problems that led to Paul's letters to them. As did Paul, he focused on the need for love among Christians.

Miguel Agustín Pro, martyr, died 1927 Saturday, November 23rd

Pro grew up in a time when the Mexican revolutionaries accused the church of siding with the wealthy. He became a Jesuit priest, and worked on behalf of the poor and homeless. Falsely accused of throwing a bomb at a government official, he was executed, but not before crying out "Long live Christ the King!"






"Glory" | December 6, 8, & 14, 2024

OLIVE PRESS

For us, night is falling. Daylight hours shorten; warmth fades. Winter approaches. In the gospel, Jesus and the disciples will soon spend an anguished night in a garden named "Olive Press" (Gethsemane). Today on the Mount of Olives he prepares them for trauma that will press far beyond their circle. Interlocking catastrophes will be natural and political: earthquakes, famine, war. Magnificent architecture will lie in ruins. We too know of cascading disasters: earthquake, tsunami, nuclear accident. Our personal world can suddenly fly apart from a storm or assault or death in the family. A song in Leonard Bernstein's *Mass* laments "how easily things get broken."

The disciples ask what will happen, and when. Our human need for control is very deep, and not to be scorned. When overwhelmed, we naturally search for signs and limits. Jesus answers indirectly, telling them and us not to be led astray. When we are vulnerable, the dishonest will try to play on our fears. "Do not be alarmed," Jesus says. It is not that we are to stop feeling, but we are to stay as moored as we can when the moorings themselves are broken.

The practices and beliefs we cultivate that ordinarily ground us will not survive unchanged through crisis, but return to us in a different form. When everything else is stripped away we discover what endures: friendship, love, trust. Assembly, word, sacrament. God.

In Bernstein's *Mass*, after chalice and celebrant are broken, the stage goes dark. A long deathly silence yields to an almost imperceptible melody on a single flute. Gradually the song is taken up by the whole room, and all go in peace.

"Birth pangs," Jesus called their trials. Through the mystery of the grace of God, two thousand years later we are still telling the story of the end that became the beginning: the broken temple, a place of prayer. The broken body, the bread of heaven. Olive Press, the garden of resurrection.
